Where we started

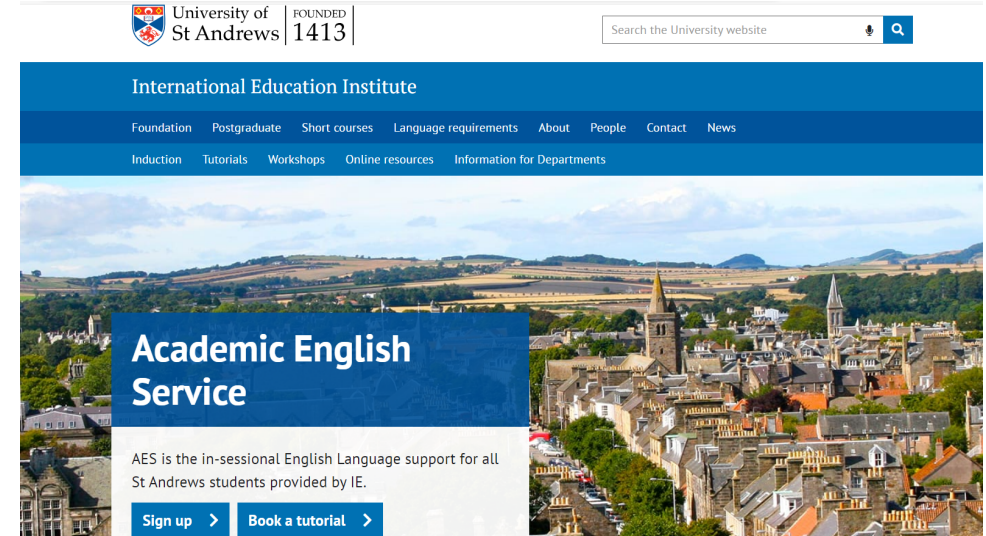
- CEED (Centre for Educational Enhancement and Development)
 - One-to-one “study skills” support
 - All UG and PGT students
 - Up to 3 per semester in the first instance
 - Staffed by trained PGR (PhD) tutors
 - Online (since COVID), up to 60 minutes

Where we started

- Academic English Service (AES, IE)
 - One-to-one language support
 - NNS Only
 - One 25 minutes session per week, otherwise unlimited sessions (UG-PGTs) with any tutor
 - One 50 minutes session every 3 weeks with the same tutor

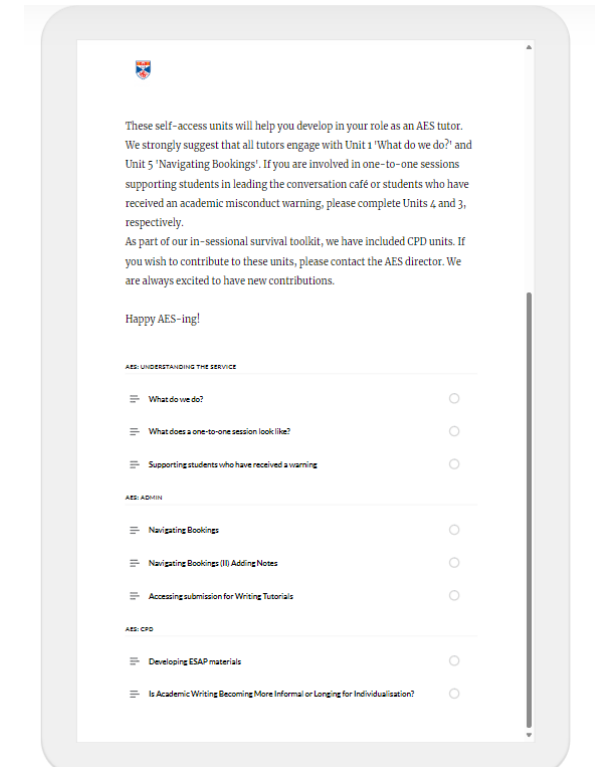
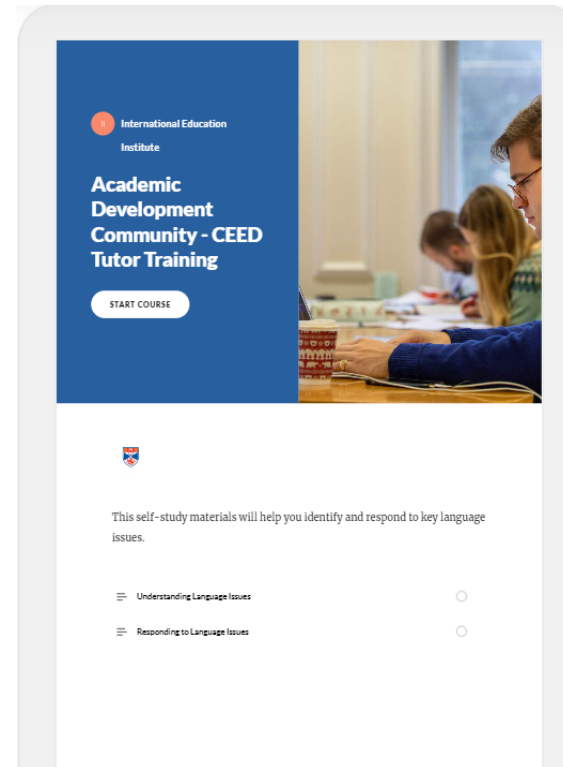
