

# What does the narrative arc mean?


- Narrative arc in a story is the underlying structure/frame
- Narrative arc indicates the writer understands the meaning of their experience (Koenig & Hortsman, 2015)
- Trauma and narrative=storytelling alleviates psychological pain





## Studies using LIWC-22 (Narrative Arc)


- 1. Abstracts (Guizzardi et al., 2023)
- Main finding: NA in Reviews different from Primary studies
- 2. Narratives in creative writing class (Nicholes, 2024)
- Main Finding: NA in SF closer to normative arc than CNF
- 3. Music Lyrics (Alberhasky & Durkee, 2024)
- Main Finding: music lyrics of Pop, Rap and Country genres follow normative NA structure; Country (highest staging)/Pop (highest plot prog and Cog Ten)


### Narrative Arc in LIWC-22 (Boyd et al. 2020)




• Over **40,000** texts (novels, short stories, movie scripts, TATs)

#### Story Type: sporting event


#### Narrative Score= 18.3475



Staging= 38.225

Cog. Tension= 2.43375

- 211 personal narratives ("Self Story" assignment)
- Group by story type and compare
- SPSS **Kruskal-Wallis** (.050 recommended for sig.)
- IRB approval (T.U. May 15, 2024)

## Description of Corpus by Story Type

250 word min.


Story Type	Description	# Essays	WC (AVG)
COVID	Stories of COVID experience	9	869
Personal Challenge	Bullied at school/colleague at work, sports, relationships, giving birth	33	808
New Experience	Learning an instrument/sport, driving, starting college, first job	50	728
Death	Family member, friend	27	836
Accident	Car accident, workplace	22	783
Fear	Childhood (spiders, animals), getting lost, natural disaster	19	852

• RQ 1: How do COVID 19 stories compare with the group?

• RQ 2: How do the different story types compare with each other?

• My guess is that COVID 19 stories will be significantly different given the impact on daily life/closer to normative arc than the rest of the group




# Staging

- Frequency of art., nouns, prepositions
- No sig. difference between types
- Good staging scores as a group



# Plot Progression


- More pronouns, auxiliary verbs, adverbs, conjunctions/linkers
- Weak for all groups especially COVID


# Cognitive Tension


• COVID/Death stories lack narrative arc

Fear-Personal Challenge	.057
Fear - Accident	.027*



#### Discussion:

1) The structure of COVID stories align closely with New Experience and Death narratives; not close to normative arc; students seem to struggle in making sense/meaning of their COVID 19 experience

2) Personal Challenge type is closest to the normative arc (different although not statistically different than the rest of the group)

### Implications for Teaching:

• Plot progression= weakness in class

• Differences in story types (weaker/stronger)

#### EAP/FYW


- NA feature in LIWC 22 useful for assessing narrative writing
- charts/graphs/stats appeal to STEM field students
- curriculum development
