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- EAP...
 - entails academic discourse competence (Bruce 2017)
 - is not seeing "students' difficulties as a linguistic deficit...but...attempts to acquire new literacy and...new communicative practices...involves new ways of behaving, interacting and thinking about the world. It is a 'social practice'..." (Hyland 2014: 393)
- Critical perspectives provide EAP with space to reflect
- Sustainability 'Our Common Future'
 - "Sustainable development is development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs." (WCED, 1987: no pagination)
