- ▶ 2010: Grenoble IUT2 “Children’s Rights” conference with other European academics - film studies in legal context
- ▶ 2012: “Women’s rights” film studies and law
- ▶ 2013: “Capital punishment” film studies and law



Collaboration with Russian colleagues

- ▶ 2013: Visit to Perm University teaching language
- ▶ 2015: Perm University 2 weeks in Linguistics Department

Perm link leads to online teaching connection and collaboration for Intercultural Communication.

- ▶ Joint lessons on Skype of Intercultural Communication.
- ▶ Sharing materials, comparing assignments. Students discussing their work over Skype.
- ▶ Projecting the Russian classroom on the screen and my students interacting.
- ▶ From 2014 onwards. (Pre-Zoom digital interaction) Knowledge Exchange.
- ▶ Pioneering the Zoom classroom idea.
- ▶ “I can’t believe we are speaking to Russians!”

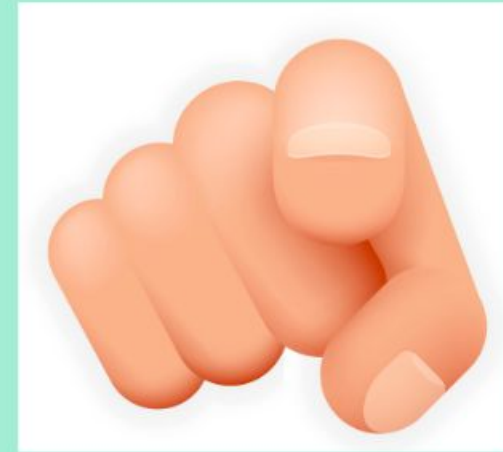
Food Waste

- Over £19million worth of food is wasted in UK every year
- 85% comes from households and the hospitality industry
- Combustion of food waste makes up for 5% of UK's greenhouse gas emissions
- One of England's primary food poverty activists is Marcus Rashford who tackled child food poverty
- He has raised enough money with FareShare charity to provide over 21million school meals - <https://fareshare.org.uk/>



Food Banks

- Foodbanks are usually the last resort for people, and with rising costs a 22% increase in demand of foodbank packages has arisen
- Food banks can provide signposting services eg. emergency finance advice, welfare support, etc
- The UK's biggest foodbank organisation is Trussell Trust
- In 2021-2022, 2,173,158 people received 3 days' worth of emergency food by Trussell Trust's Foodbanks

Food Waste

- In February 2016 France created a law forcing supermarkets to donate unsold food rather than destroy it, the first country to implement such
- 18% of food produced is wasted nationally
- 33% of food waste happens at consumer level and 14% at retail
- Target to reduce food waste by 50% by 2025
- Food waste emits 15.3million tonnes of CO2 which represents 3% of the country's year total CO2 emissions



Food Banks

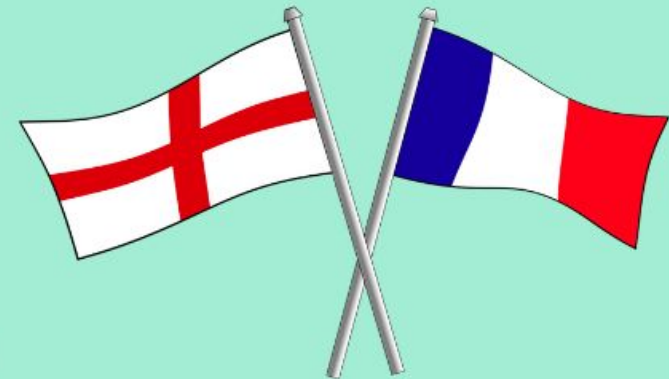
- France facing biggest recession since WW2 causing an increasing number of people to rely on food banks to provide for their families
- Up to 7million people/10% of the population of France needed foodbank handouts in 2020
- One of France's biggest foodbanks is Banques Alimentaires who collected 10,000 tons of food in 2021, the equivalent of 20million meals
- The Carrefour Foundation supports foodbank organisations across France

Similarities

- Both England and France teach about food sustainability in schools according to their governments

Differences

- While France has made it illegal for supermarkets to throw away food, UK supermarkets waste over 110,000 tonnes every year
- France is 1st on the Global Food Sustainability Index while England is 10th in Europe

WHAT ARE THE CONSEQUENCES ?

Food waste raises three problems:

- The pollution caused by this waste. This waste creates 3.3 billion tonnes of CO2 equivalent in the atmosphere each year
- The food that is thrown away cannot be given to people in need. The number of people affected by global hunger has increased to 828 million in 2021, according to a UN report.
- This waste represents an unnecessary removal of natural resources, such as farmland and water, and avoidable greenhouse gas emissions.

ACTIONS IN PLACE FROM PRESIDENT

The law "Climate and Resilience" of 22 August 2021 reflects part of the 146 proposals of the Citizens' Climate Convention adopted by the Head of State, to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 40% by 2030, in a spirit of social justice.

Several bills are proposed to sanction breaches that would harm our planet

According to the Citizens' Climate Convention, ecocide represents "any action that has caused serious ecological damage by participating in the manifest and significant overstepping of planetary limits, committed with knowledge of the consequences that would result and which could not be ignored".



— SOLUTIONS —

Turn off the light when you leave the room and save electricity (65% of the electricity produced in La Réunion is of fossil origin)

Avoid the use of solvent-based products (oil paints, gasoline, turpentine, pesticides and others).

THE GOOD GUIDE FOR STAYING ALIVE

PLASTIC GROUP 1

CAUSES

HOW DID THIS HAPPEN?

Production and development of thousands of new plastic products accelerated after World War II. Plastics revolutionized medicine with life-saving devices, made space travel possible, lightened cars and jets—saving fuel and pollution—and saved lives with helmets, incubators, and equipment for clean drinking water.

The conveniences plastics offer, however, led to a throw-away culture that reveals the material's dark side: today, single-use plastics account for 40 percent of the plastic produced every year. Many of these products, such as plastic bags and food wrappers, have a lifespan of mere minutes to hours, yet they may persist in the environment for hundreds of years.

PLASTIC POLLUTION IS PERSISTENT

When released into the environment, plastics can be ultimately degraded via different processes. However, it likely takes much longer time for plastics to degrade in the environment. For example, complete degradation of plastics may take years to centuries, especially in the natural environments. Taken together, plastics can be resistant to degradation, thus being persistent in the environment, which is probably a typical feature of plastic pollution.



NUMBERS

IN 2016, EACH FRENCH PERSON GENERATED 66 KILOS OF PLASTIC WASTE. NATIONALLY, THAT'S A MOUNTAIN OF 4.5 MILLION TONNES. THIS ONE, FRANCE HAS WON THE PLACE OF THE LARGEST PRODUCER OF PLASTIC WASTE IN THE MEDITERRANEAN BAS

CONSEQUENCES

WHAT IT TRIGGERS

Many factors contribute to environmental degradation. Plastic waste plays a major role in the destruction of marine and terrestrial biodiversity. They represent a real threat to humans, nature and animals. It is for this reason that it is crucial to know the damage generated by the scattering of this type of waste.



HEALTH

Plastic is harmful to animals and nature, but it is also harmful to human beings. Its entire life cycle involves hazards that threaten human health. This cycle represents a danger for humans, for the environment and for the entire ecology.

VORTEX

Waste that gathers together, it creates vortex. After currents and trap boats

DAMAGE TO MARINE LIFE

Marine biodiversity is one of the most immediate victims of plastic pollution. By suffocation, entanglement or injuries of all kinds related to floating debris, more than 1.5 million marine animals perish each year.

SOIL POLLUTION

Plastic left in landfills, subject to the vagaries of the weather, interacts with water and lets its chemicals seep into the subsoil. Eventually, a possible worsening of soil pollution and a deterioration in the quality of drinking water.



SOLUTIONS

1



Reduce your consumption of plastic packaging : avoid over-packaging and choose more ecological materials. For example, in Grenoble, there are zero waste shops. Moreover, in France, McDonald uses new recyclable and reusable packaging.

2



Reuse plastic : for example, in France, in 2020, there was the creation of an anti-waste law which prohibited certain plastic products (straw)

3



participate in plastic waste collection : to fight the pollution of the oceans or our cities, we must clean our beaches and our streets, many associations like "wings of the ocean".

4



recycle plastic waste : 65% of plastic packaging is now recyclable
