Project background and rationale

BALEAP is the global forum for EAP professionals. It supports the professional development of those involved in learning, teaching, scholarship and research in English for Academic Purposes. Access to seminal literature and up-to-date research is fundamental in EAP practice. BALEAP encourages EAP practitioners to develop their knowledge base and to engage in informed practice. This is a core requirement in the TEAP accreditation and competency framework. This relies on access to literature written not only for the EAP community specifically but also wider bodies of literature in fields such as linguistics, applied linguistics, education, TESOL, sociology and other disciplines.

Despite the acknowledged importance of access to literature for all EAP practitioners in all contexts, it may be the case that many colleagues have difficulty accessing different types of literature. The challenges in accessing literature are likely to vary but it is not clear how much of a problem this presents to EAP teachers in different contexts or at different times of the year. To date, there does not appear to be any systematic and methodologically rigorous attempt to gather insights into:

- 1) what literature EAP practitioners feel they need to/want to access
- 2) the reasons why teachers want to access this literature
- 3) whether they face any challenges in doing so

4) what strategies they employ in order to access literature **or** how they manage not having access to literature for teaching or research purposes.

Key duties and Responsibilities

- Co-lead on desk research including searching, reviewing and summarising relevant literature.
- Work closely with co-researchers, the BALEAP Research and Publications Officers, any research assistants, and other stakeholders to co-lead on research design, data collection, data analysis and dissemination.
- Provide methodological and research expertise throughout the process.
- Undertake data collection and/or support others to do so (depending on research design).
- Undertake transparent data analysis.
- Prepare written outputs suitable for a range of audiences.

Knowledge, Experience and Skills Required

- Recent experience of face to face and digital EAP learning and teaching.
- An understanding or experience of diverse EAP practices and working conditions in different contexts.
- Experience of research design and data collection, preferably questionnaire design.
- Experience of advising on and critiquing research methodologies.
- Experience of representing a research team at meetings or other forums with key stakeholders.
- Experience in the writing of briefs, presentations, and papers for different audiences.
